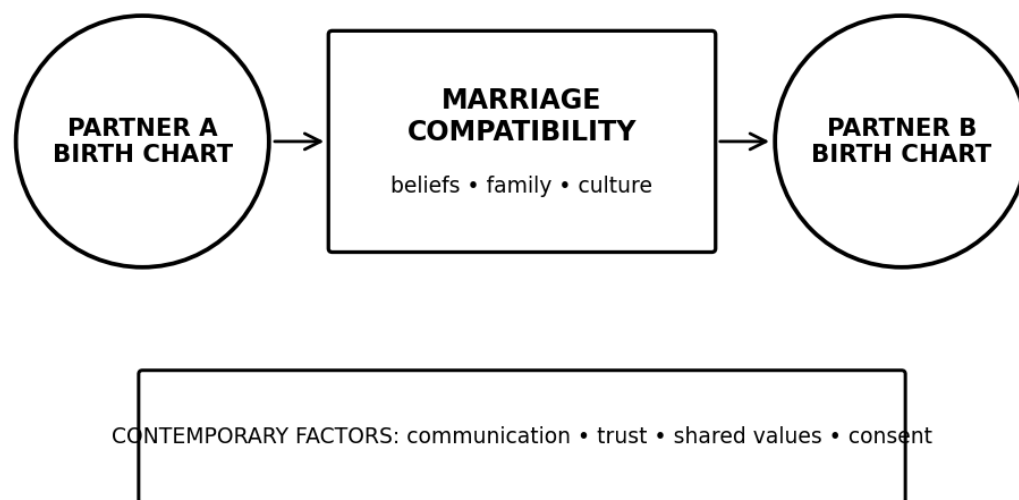




Figure 1. Astrology, marriage compatibility, and contemporary social factors.
